Cottesbrooke resident and electric vehicle (EV) owner Alexina Cassidy got in touch to tell of her experience as part of our *Climate Change And...* series, so VL asked her to do a bit of research ...

# EVs are cheaper to 'fuel', tax, service and insure. But are they the 'greener' option?

All over the world, governments are promoting electric vehicles (EVs) as the answer to reducing our dependence on oil and our carbon footprint and introducing legislation to force the issue.

In the UK, EVs accounted for almost one in six new cars sold in 2021. Plug-in cars are anticipated to account for more than a quarter of the market by the end 2022. But, are EVs are as green as the hype portrays? What are the main issues surrounding whether or not to switch?

#### How do prices compare?

EVs have traditionally been more expensive than internal combustion engines (ICEs) but the gap is closing. The best value EVs cost around £25,000 to £30,000 new. However more than 90% of EV buyers do not buy the car outright but opt for a PCP (Personal Contract Purchase) with monthly costs varying between £200-£400 depending on a variety of factors.

#### What do I pay to charge my EV?

Charging at home overnight is the cheapest option, but that is not available to all. According to Zap-Map, who provide useful maps of charging points throughout the UK, there are 31,507 charging points across 19,707 charging locations in the UK. This is made up of high speed en-route chargers to on-street provision.

As for the cost of electricity, this varies widely depending on your location and energy provider but the default price for the East Midlands based on the April 2022 price cap is 26.3p/kwh (kilowatt hour). EV battery sizes vary from 30kwh to over 100kwh. From summarizing the latest research available, an EV will save you about 10p/mile on 'fuel', so depending on how much you drive annually you can work out how much going electric will save you.

### Where does my electricity come from?

Over the past year 41.3% is generated from fossil fuels, 25% from renewable energy and 25.4% from 'other energy', namely nuclear and biomass. So, electricity generation needs to get much cleaner for EV emissions to be fully 'green'.

### What are the environmental costs of production?

Batteries rely on raw materials that have been connected to environmental catastrophes and human rights concerns as well as being water intensive to manufacture. Positive steps are being made to mitigate all these issues, but there is some way to go.



#### How long will a battery last?

Current predictions are that EV batteries will last for approximately 100,000 miles, so depending on annual mileage 10-20 years. Battery range varies from over 300 miles to 55 miles but much depends on weather temperatures and type of journey.

### What provision is there for EVs in Northamptonshire?

According to the latest DfT data (April 22), there are 107 public EV charging devices in West Northamptonshire, which equates to 26.3 devices per 100,000 people. This is compared to the UK average of 45.2 devices per 100,000 people. In February 2022, the two Northamptonshire Councils unveiled new on-street EV charging stations (82 charging sockets) thanks to a UK Innovate grant. The locations were chosen to benefit those who do not have access to a driveway. If successful, the Councils plan to introduce more.


### Over The Counter



H & T Parish Council has allocated funding in support of the continuation of the 59 / 60 (Market Harborough – Northampton) bus service provided by UNO.

### **HOLLOWELL BIRDING NOTES -**

Ring Ouzels – mountaindwellers passing through the county.

I'd say that most birders get particularly excited by migratory birds. They are scarce, less familiar than our resident birds and therefore



exotic - and the consideration of their journey can bring a sense of somewhere far away, in this case the mountains of Scotland, Norway or Morocco. I was therefore delighted to find a female Ring Ouzel at Honey Hill, near Cold Ashby on April 3<sup>rd</sup> and then four together there – three males and a female . This party lingered for a few days and were joined by two further birds – the best gathering recorded in Northants for several years.

The Ring Ouzel is a member of the thrush family. Somewhat similar in appearance to the Blackbird, the male being mostly black and the female and immature birds dark brown; but the adult male has a bold white crescent-shape across the lower breast. On female and immature birds, the crescent is offwhite or cream and is less distinct. All plumages have silvery wing panels which are visible from some distance. Seen well, the underparts can have a distinctive scaly appearance. The male bird's bill is dull yellow and black. Ring Ouzels are usually shy and flighty: when flushed they often fly a long distance and may even vanish from the scene altogether. Ring Ouzels pass through the UK in Spring, having spent the winter in the mountains of Southern Spain and North Africa. On passage they can be found on high exposed ground, chalk downs and hilly scarps. In Northants, favoured sites are Honey Hill, Newnham Hill near Daventry, Harrington Airfield and the Brampton Valley. They can also turn up in horse paddocks, sheep pastures and rough ground anywhere in the county. They feed on worms and other invertebrates and also on berries. Their breeding grounds are in high mountains and moorland in Fenno-Scandinavia and upland parts of the British Isles and central and Eastern Europe.

The song of the Ring Ouzel is a repeated fluting phrase with some variation; it can be hauntingly melancholic as it echoes around a high mountain corrie. In this situation the birds can be hard to spot amid the steep rubble-strewn slopes that they typically frequent.

By the time you read this, Ring Ouzels will almost certainly have departed from this region and will be in their mountainous breeding grounds. However, it's worth making a note in the diary: next April - and also in September and October, they may once more be back in their favoured stop-off locations as they head south towards their wintering grounds.

# MESSAGE FROM REVEREND CAROLINE BURNETT, THE UPLANDS GROUP OF CHURCHES

### **CHURCH NEWS**

It will seem as though everything that could be written about Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II will have been written by now, as the celebrations of the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of her reign are immediately upon us. And yet it would seem wrong not to add to those words in this summer edition of Village Link.

Perhaps at this time we might reflect on what our Queen has meant to us over the years. I can remember, as a child, being taken to watch the Trooping the Colour and being told by my mother, "That was the Queen", when all I'd seen was a procession of people in military uniform ride past on horseback. I felt certain then that if I was the Queen I'd always wear a long dress and never be caught without my crown. Twenty or so years later I got a little bit closer to her when I went with a group of people from the home for the elderly where I was working to see her visiting a local school. She was friendly and gracious, accepting endless posies of flowers and even a single daisy picked from the lawn by a very small boy. A while after that, and because of it, some of those elderly people appeared in a BBC documentary called 'The Day I Met the Queen'. The programme closed with one of the elderly women saying softly but proudly, "I shall never forget it 'til the day I die."

I think our Queen is loved and treasured because she serves. The word service is one that's been used a lot about Her Majesty over recent months; perhaps as she grows old we see how different and sacrificial her life is compared to ours, with no

opportunity for a quiet retirement and no chance of retreating from the public gaze. But she seems to accept her servant role with the same grace and dignity with which she accepted the gift of a single daisy.

Recently we've also heard much about her Christian faith. It would be easy to imagine that churchgoing is just another



obligation for our monarch, but she makes it clear that her faith in Jesus Christ is real and active. And in the person of Jesus she will have found the model of servanthood that she's followed. Jesus was a servant king who washed feet, touched lepers and ate with prostitutes; and he made them all feel loved and included. No wonder, with this example, Her Majesty has been strengthened and sustained by her faith through the trials of her life and under the responsibilities that she carries.

So we give thanks for our Queen as she shows us what a life of faith and service looks like, and for all that she has meant to us throughout our lives.


