

Hop On A Hopper

A new type of bus service is driving through Northamptonshire. CommMiniBus, a social enterprise established in 2020, provides transport for people and communities which other operators are unable to serve. They specialise in minibus operation and started the Kettering Catcher flexible bus service, in October 2020. Since then new services have been introduced including two that cover the Village Link area.

The Shopper Hopper offers communities in the Brixworth area, including Cold Ashby, Creaton, Cottesbrooke and Thornby, a choice of shopping destinations: Aldi in Overstone, Weston Favell Centre, or Morrisons at Spinney Hill. Trips are on Mondays with one destination per week. The Haddon Hopper is the latest service and starts on 14th February, offering residents of Guilsborough and Teeton trips to Rugby on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of the month, and to Daventry on the 2nd and 4th

orientated, consequently, the best route and timetable for a trip are generated in accordance with passenger bookings. You can be any age to use this service and the fares are worked out based on the mileage. Bus pass holders are eligible for free off-peak travel.

Climate Change and accommodation


Tiny Homes from Teeton

If you hashtag #tinyhouse or #tinyhousemovement on Instagram you will see a wonderful selection of small-scale-living buildings from around the world, chiefly the USA, Australia and New Zealand. These are the places where the Tiny House Movement has taken off as a lifestyle choice offering good and interesting down-size options with ecological and financial advantages.

Interested? Well, in Teeton there is a company that make such buildings. Qube is a family-run company who manufacture modular buildings including Eco Tiny Homes. The company was started in 2007 by Mick Spittle, originally manufacturing garden offices and then moving on to buildings for schools, hotels and others places.

In 2022 Qube moved from their base in Abington out to Teeton to bring their manufacturing base together with the back office and administration. Associate Director Jordan Spittle told VL that the move was quite a learning curve, almost like starting

from scratch as far as the manufacturing process was concerned.



Jordan is also a keen follower of the Tiny Homes movement and has carried out considerable research into what should go into these buildings. Qube's Eco Tiny Homes are built on a chassis so that they can be manoeuvred but unlike those in other countries cannot be lived in permanently without becoming subject to planning permission. However this does not seem to deter purchasers, especially farmers and land owners who buy them for use as Air B'n'B accommodation as part of diversification.

Writing in BBC Culture, Beverley D'Silva points out that the idea of having less space and therefore less stuff can create room in our lives for more important things, which is certainly an appealing one. These structures are a sustainable option for housing. They are energy efficient, eco-friendly and affordable. They are versatile and along with their affordability can create an environmentally sustainable building solution for a wide range of people and needs. Sustainability is the watchword and the Eco Tiny Homes are built with energy conservation at the top of the agenda. Energy can be supplied by solar/battery power, or even wind turbine, and the rainwater is harvested and stored along with grey water for reuse.

As well as making sure their products are right, it is also important to Qube that the company fits in the area where they live and work. For the business this means that materials are sourced from local merchants and that employment opportunities can be met locally – including Billy Canham from Teeton, who the firm is to sponsor his carpentry apprenticeship at Northampton College.

Jordan says that they are keen for local people to see that Qube is "not just a business plonked here!". Come the warmer weather there are plans to hold open days and coffee mornings so that villagers may see what goes on.

Rugby has featured large in the Spittle family and the company sponsor the rugby XV at Northampton School for Boys, the ladies team at Old Northamptonians. Qube also supports the Cynthia Spencer Hospice and the McArthy Dixon Foundation.

St Michael and All Angels Church

Update on progress to improve facilities:

Creaton PCC is delighted to announce that we now have sufficient funds to instruct Goodfellows Builders to commence the reordering work in St Michael and All Angels Church previously discussed in our public meetings.

We are very grateful for generous grants received or pledged from 7 charities to the value of almost £41,000 which, together with our Fabric Fund built up through local fund raising over several years, will cover the cost of this work.

The project will install a fully accessible toilet attached to mains drainage, improve the servery area, remove 6 pews to provide a level clear area for socialising and re-site the font. The work is scheduled to start on Tuesday I Ith April 2023. It is estimated to take 8 weeks, so hopefully will be ready for a celebration at Creaton in Bloom on Sunday 4th June!

We plan that the work to remove the gas central heating system and install radiant heaters will take place during the reordering process. However, we are still awaiting a Faculty (permission) from Peterborough Diocese before the work on changing the heating system can commence. This will divert some funds as it is essential to introduce a more economic and instant heating system suitable for the additional use we foresee the church attracting in the future. It will also make us a user of all green energy. We are postponing the screen to the tower arch until we have further funds.

We hope that you are as excited as we are that these plans to improve the church for the community are finally coming to fruition. Anyone interested in acquiring a vintage pew or radiator let us know!

supplements the existing sign that says dogs should be on leads. CCTV has shown numerous parishioners not adhering to the request, especially those who use dog ball throwers on the playing surfaces. The GPFA have a responsibility to protect children and others from infections resulting from traces of dog faeces. Some local Playing Fields have banned dogs from their playing field



2022 SUMMARY

In 2022 the Guilsborough Playing Field has been used extensively for A) Cricket: senior and junior cricket for men's and ladies teams, junior boys and girls teams B) Junior football teams at under 11s and 16s, C) Local schools' sports events D) Primary school sports, E) Informal football and cricket use of the football nets and wicket nets, F) Keep-fit exercise equipment. Funding the maintenance of the facility continues to be a challenge, and the GPFA welcomes parishioners onto its General Committee who are supportive of enabling sporting recreational facilities to many, especially juniors. The GPFA also welcomes companies to provide financial support through sponsorship and advertising at the Field.

CRICKET NEWS

A very successful season for the seniors: 4 Saturday sides. 3 midweek sides, one a ladies. The Saturday Ist XI were Northants County T20 Cup winners and Northants Cricket League (NCL) Division 2 champions. The Saturday 3rd team also secured promotion to Division 12 of the NCL. The season was also notable for the number of junior players moving into Senior Cricket some playing at 1st and 2nd XI level. Similar sides will run in the 2023 season, with 3 or 4 junior sides in addition to the 7 adult sides across Saturdays and Wednesdays.

FOOTBALL NEWS

West Haddon Junior Football Club have based two of their teams at the GPFA venue for the 2022/3 season (September -April), their U16s and their U11s. Both teams consists of boys from West Haddon and surrounding villages. The UIIs team have a couple of girls on their team. As part of the use of the venue West Haddon JFC have committed to spend £6,000 per season on the pitches for each of the next 6 seasons. The money will be spent on re-seeding, fertiliser, aeration and vertidraining. The agreement with West Haddon IFC is however not exclusive and other teams can hire the venue when they're

not using it. All bookings come directly through GPFA rather than WHJFC sub-letting the pitches. With the WHJFC investment in the pitches and the improved playing surfaces, it should become a desirable venue for other teams.



U16s play their 11-a-side matches on Sunday afternoon using the large pitch at the far end of the venue. The UIIs play their 9-a-side matches on Saturday mornings, using the smaller pitch outside the pavilion.




THE GRIGOR WHO SAVED CHRISTMAS

MESSAGE FROM REVEREND CAROLINE BURNETT THE UPLANDS GROUP OF CHURCHES

CHURCH NEWS

It seems to help us get through life when we break it down into manageable portions of time. We start with the four seasons which helpfully divide up the twelve months of the year into three month stretches.

Something I noticed last September when Strictly Come Dancing came onto our TV screens once again, is that reality TV shows are another way seasons are marked out and time is divided into chunks; I heard someone say, 'You know Christmas is coming when Strictly starts.' and yes, it does track those months after our summer holidays through until Christmas. Strictly is followed in January by Dancing on Ice and along will come The Great British Sewing Bee and The Great British Bake Off and several others.

In fact there seems to be a reality TV show for everyone, cooking, pottery, woodwork - they're all out there. Some demonstrate the best in humanity with creativity and mutual support whilst others reveal the worst with backbiting and one-upmanship. But whichever ones we follow, we can find ourselves invested in the lives and concerns of complete strangers, or of celebrities we'd never heard of before, and genuinely caring about who ends up the last person standing. What these shows can do is give us a focus and a start and end date for a chunk of time, and perhaps this helps us pick our way through a life that's often complicated and sometimes painful. I've written before about the seasons that the Church keeps

and this is another way we divide up time. The Church seasons like Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter are a way to help us to experience more deeply the story of God working in the world through Jesus. If TV reality shows and Church seasons are similar in that they both serve the purpose of marking out time, there's a glaring and vitally



important difference between them. Reality TV shows invariably have the format of exclusion – one contestant after another is eliminated until only one remains. There are often tears and a sense of loss when this happens.


The Church's seasons on the other hand, are, at their best, about inclusion; they're about an ever-growing group of people being drawn into the story of God's love, to be supported, healed and blessed by the communities they join.

I'm not about to stop following Strictly Come Dancing or the

Sewing Bee (my two favourites) but as I watch contestants going home feeling sad and a bit rejected I remember that there is another reality where no one is sent away. God's love, expressed through God's Church, is all embracing and everwelcoming.
