

## Climate Change and Community Groups

The connection between climate change and community groups might seem a bit tenuous, especially when the groups in question are not 'about' the environment! But one of the unexpected benefits of the Covid lockdown in many of our villages has been the formation of community support groups, and in Guilsborough, that includes two community groups that have reduced waste, reduced car journeys, saved money, built connections and skills, and even launched new careers! Village Link spoke to some of the people involved to find out more ...

### It started with a 9ft Eucalyptus Tree ...



In October 2021 an elderly resident who Gary Ashworth was supporting during lockdown asked for help with getting rid of a large Eucalyptus tree in a pot. Gary says: "At the time, I thought, well that's too good to throw away, surely someone local will want it? So, I set up a recycling WhatsApp group named after Noel Edmonds Swap Shop programme from the 1970s". It's grown by word of mouth, with members asking other people to

be added. Today the group has over 100 members and since it started an estimated 800 items have been offered for free (or low charge) within Guilsborough. Items don't have to be

'swapped' as such, they range from kitchenware and furniture to jigsaw puzzles, books, exercise equipment and clothing. Members can also put out requests for specific items before buying new or looking further afield. The group has a few basic rules, and it's mostly self-policing: "Please allow everyone to have an opportunity to say they would like something. If you think a relative or friend would like something, please ask them before commenting on the post. Gary also advises new joiners: "If you want money for something, be upfront about it, 99% is FOC though. It's first come first served. Once you have agreed the swap, take it offline so that everyone doesn't have to read your delivery messages."



### Agony Aunt for all things 'plant'

Another Guilsborough community group that came out of lockdown is the WhatsApp Gardening Group, where Gay Webster is the resident Agony Aunt. Says Gay: "I was approached by Ruth Harper back in Spring 2020. Ruth wanted to create a supportive group

where people could share knowledge and cuttings and the like. I was happy to join and be on hand to advise and support if needed. Today it's my neighbour Sue McGlasson who does the admin role, adding people to the group on request. There are 48 of us currently, and new people are made welcome." Members of the group save money and waste by sharing seeds, purchasing in bulk, and getting better at what they do. In 2020 they bulk bought one hundred and forty 60 litre bags

of compost saving themselves £2.30 per bag. Adds Gay: "Growing things from seed can be so hit and miss, with germinations ranging from 3 to 100, the group has enabled us to experiment without committing to a whole packet of seeds, and to share things easily. Repurposing success stories include the former Guinea Pig hutch that became a cabbage planter or the loo rolls cores that housed sweet peas." A couple of members of the group have even decided to explore careers in horticulture! Perhaps the biggest benefit of the group has been social. Says Gay: "The group has been a way of getting to know people and been very supportive. We all feel better connected with people in the village." 

He was also a volunteer driver for DACT and a supporter of the playing field, regularly emptying their bins for many years and collecting litter. He was also a member of the URC.

Nothing was ever too much trouble for Reg and he always had a practical solution for everything. Once on arriving at the village hall for a council meeting to find it had been double booked by dancers he didn't hesitate to open the URC for them and made a number of trips to drive them there, leaving everyone happy with the outcome!

Reg's dedication to volunteering his time to both the parish council and the village was recognised in 2019 when the Northamptonshire Association of Local Councils awarded him an invitation to the Queen's Garden Party. He thoroughly

enjoyed the experience with his wife Jean, who was his mainstay.

Reg brought a big smile and a sense of humour to any parish council meeting he attended. To show their appreciation the parish council was pleased to gift him with a falconry experience to share with Jean when he retired as a parish councillor. His predecessor, Simon Smith, is stepping down after 5 years, and was thanked sincerely at the recent Annual General Meeting for his stewardship and especially his fundraising contribution. He is to continue as a corresponding GPFA committee member. The GPFA were nominated for 'The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service' but although not successful, our work in the community was very much admired by an independent National Assessment Committee. If the GPFA had been successful, the award is the highest accolade given to volunteer groups across the UK, and Sir Martyn Lewis, Chair of the QAVS National Assessment Committee said the nomination represents a tremendous achievement for the GPFA. ## **JOAN LEATHERLAND 1932-2023**



tonshire on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1932, the youngest daughter of Fanny Beatrice Lovell and Norman Lovell with an older sister Irene known as Renee. She went to school in Welford and then in Guilsborough.

Her first job saw her cycling the three miles or so to Elkington Lodge where she worked as a housekeeper. She then moved to a job in Rugby manufacturing spark plugs; the firm she worked for ran a bus which went

round the villages and took their employees to and from work. Later on she worked with her sister in law, Edna, in the Leatherland family building business.

As a family they enjoyed holidays in Southsea where they stayed for several years in the same bed and breakfast with a lady called Mrs Adams. Later the family owned a caravan in Skegness, so there were holidays there as well.

Joan continued with her love of dancing and for a number of years she and Jim enjoyed going to a dance club in Long Buckby on Tuesday evenings. Another hobby she enjoyed was knitting.

Joan was born in Thornby, Northamp-


She was granny to Amy-Jade and George who she loved to see and they enjoyed playing cards together; they all thought that Granny's home cooked stew was the best. She also loved gardening and she and Jim opened their garden as part of the National Gardens Scheme for over thirty years. They were founder members of the Northamptonshire branch of the Hardy Plant Society and were well known for their gardening skills, opening their own stunning garden twice a year for the National Garden Scheme. They were expert galanthophiles, breeding hundreds of different varieties of snowdrops.

After Jim passed away in May 2016 Joan continued to live in the beloved home that Jim had built. Sadly, in December 2021 she had a fall and broke her hip. She was determined to return home, and did, but then suffered another fall in February which shattered her confidence. She had to make the very hard decision to leave Hollowell and all the friends she had there; in particular her neighbours Nick and Matilda who were always there when she needed them, and Gill and Ian Brown who had been Joan and Jim's lifetime friends.

So, in April 2022 she moved to Timken Grange care home where she was brilliantly looked after. She took an interest in activities in the home and enjoyed bingo and carpet bowls as well as sitting in her armchair watching snooker and darts.

## EAGLES IN NORTHAMPTONSHIRE

Primarily a bird of coasts, large lakes and rivers, White-tailed Eagles are not resident in Northamptonshire, however they are increasingly recorded passing through the county. A conservation success story, White-tailed Eagles – also sometimes called 'sea eagles' - were persecuted to extinction in the British Isles in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, but after successful reintroduction programmes in Scotland in the 1970s and more recently the Isle of Wight, the British population is now increasing slowly. Immature birds from the Isle of Wight project disperse and travel huge distances and this has accounted for most of the recent sightings in our landlocked county.

With a wingspan of up to 2.4 meters, the White-tailed Eagle is the UK's largest bird of prey – two times the size of a Common Buzzard and significantly bulkier.



Mainly feeding on fish, waterbirds such as geese, and mammals, they will also scavenge carrion and offal from various sources, both natural and of human origin, e.g. fisheries and abattoirs. They are opportunistic feeders and will steal prey from other birds and even mammals such as otters.

A White-tailed Eagle in flight has a distinctive profile, with huge rectangular wings which often cause them to be described as a 'flying barn door'. The wedge-shaped tail may appear very short in relation to the massive wing area. The head, bill and neck are heavy and strong and often appear more prominent than in other raptors. The white tail is only attained once the bird is at least four years old: immature birds are uniformly brown. The equally majestic Golden Eagle has a slightly smaller wingspan, but a very different profile: the wings are narrower, the tail is longer and the head and neck less prominent in flight. In the British Isles, Golden Eagles are confined to high mountain areas in the Scottish Highlands and Islands.

On their wanderings, White-tailed Eagles may cover long distances, easily covering 100 miles in a day. They may roost overnight in woodland, copses and hedgerow trees. They often draw the attention of crows and other raptors: the bird most recently seen in Northamptonshire was being mobbed repeatedly by Red Kites.

All of the Isle of Wight project birds carry radio transmitters, allowing them to be tracked by satellite. The transmitter batteries are solar-powered, which means they can continue working for many years.

To support my work as county bird recorder, Tim Mackrill of the Roy Dennis Foundation (see roydennis.org) kindly provides me with satellite tracking information, which has helped me to confirm the identification of several sightings in

Northamptonshire. Several birds have also passed through the county unseen – including one which passed by on a southward track, a few hundred meters west of Hollowell village – tantalisingly close to home (I was working at the time and sadly didn't see it!) Young birds can be seen across much of the year – so keep your eyes peeled for that 'barn door' silhouette! ## VILLAGE HALL QUIZ NIGHT



Dear Friends.

Although it is now nearly Easter, as I write this letter in church we are marking the season of Lent. Lent recalls the story of forty days spent in the wilderness where Jesus was tempted by Satan to betray all that he believed in. It was a time of prayer, fasting, torment, isolation, hunger. It was a journey of preparation and transformation. A journey that would eventually lead him to the cross and then to glory.

Lent is a season that should challenge our faith. ## BUS ROUTE 59/60





Another piece of good bus news is that the service 59/60 has been secured for a further 12 months. This follows a petition with 370+ signatories, representation from 4

parish Chairs at full council, and with a budget amendment proposed by the Lib Dem Group at the budget meeting which was accepted. Jonathan Harris, West Northants Councillor, told the VL that there is a bus review taking place. A consultant has been engaged by West Northants who is looking at the whole issue of buses. "We are awaiting the findings and proposals" say Jonathan, "and I am part of a bus service working group, so I hope that we will get these views feeding through soon".
