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Autumn migration is now well underway, giving a great opportunity to see shorebirds, or waders, passing through Northamptonshire.

A small number of wader species breed in Northamptonshire, but most are passage migrants or winter visitors. Many are longdistance migrants, making epic journeys between their breeding territories and their wintering grounds. A Sanderling resting on the dam at Pitsford Reservoir in August may be heading south to spend the winter in Namibia, having bred in Siberia.

Commoner Dunlin and Green Sandpipers may be joined by scarcer species such as Wood Sandpipers, Sanderlings or Bar-tailed Godwits, even Avocets or Black-winged Stilts; and there is always the possibility of a rarity. Pectoral Sandpiper, Kentish Plover and Temminck's Stint have all been seen in the county in recent years.

Waders can present identification challenges

- and to many birders this is part of their appeal. A mantra for anyone wishing to develop their bird ID skills is to 'learn the calls'. I'd say this is particularly relevant with waders, as they may reveal their presence with distinctive calls. The ringing 'teu-teuteu' of a Greenshank or the 'choowit' of a Spotted Redshank are particularly diagnostic. The Whimbrel has a very distinctive rapid repeating call, the origin of its old name 'Seven Whistler'. This call is often heard at night - several folk stories describe these birds as portents of tragedy. Wader calls can be highly evocative, recalling the places where they are more usually encountered: the bubbling call of the Curlew will always transport me to mountain habitats in Scotland and the Yorkshire Dales.

Good locations for waders in the county include former gravel pits

such as Summer Leys and Titchmarsh Local Nature Reserves and Northampton Washlands, Reservoirs can also provide suitable habitat, however most waders need exposed mud to feed, so these sites will be most productive after periods of low rainfall. New habitat is being created via conservation projects and flood protection schemes including the new workings in the Brampton Valley. Waders may even frequent temporary habitat on industrial sites. The DIRFT 3 logistics development has recently been as good a location as any in the county; however, as the project approaches completion the habitat is shrinking – although the Wildlife Trust reserve at nearby Lilbourne Meadows is already attracting a good range of birds.

Keeping an eye on the weather can be key to finding waders: stormy or unsettled weather can 'ground' birds which would otherwise overfly without stopping; strong winds may divert them from their normal migratory routes. During the late summer and early autumn months huge numbers of these birds are on the move, so you never know, something good could turn up at any time!


LITTLE BO PEEP'S LITTLE LOST SHEEP ...


A few questions:

There are now 8 mobile camera speed awareness vans & 1 unmarked mobile unit operating only where there is a high proportion of incidents and speeding offenses.

- Road policing , increased to 48 officers available 24 hrs a day. ANPR has become an effective way in catching criminals breaking the law.
- Northamptonshire policing no longer takes data from cabling roads, this has been replaced by ANPR fitted discreetly which can be mounted to a streetlight or an upright sign and records vehicle movement over the course of 7 days. A report is then produced to identify key information if required.
- In a recent 2 week period, 967 vehicles were stopped, 88 persons arrested with 188 vehicles taken off the road.
- The expectation is that in the near future DRUG driving will be more widespread than DRINK driving.

Chief Inspector Nick Adderly is determined to address the problems within the County.

Cllr Horne recently attended a meeting for Police Liaison Representatives and has the following to report:

- It was highlighted that Northamptonshire is still one of the worst counties in the country for poor driving and traffic offenses and incidents.
- It was noted that there has been no real deterrent for 10 years, with static speed cameras not operating, resulting in drivers ignoring speed limits.
- A further 1.3 million has been invested in ANPR cameras which have been fitted to cars & static positions around the county

Hopefully, many of our motorists have spotted the new speed awareness device that is now operational. Most of the cost was covered by a grant from the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner and we hope it will encourage drivers to remain within the speed limit. We purchased a number of the mounting plates which will enable us to move the device around the village for maximum benefit.

Whilst it cannot capture images of speeding cars, it does record speeds which we will be able to analyse and, should it show that there is a speeding problem, we can present the data to the Police which will ultimately help us apply pressure for a Police presence to help resolve it.

Keeping on a road safety theme, there is a website called "Fix My Street" which is for reporting any problems with the condition of our roads and streets. It's very easy to use as it's map based so you can pinpoint where the problem is, upload photos and also check if it's already reported. You can report many issues including pot holes, flytipping, blocked drains, vegetation and anything else connected with the public highway except street lighting. 
In the late 1960s, at about the same time that Marvin Gaye and then Diana Ross were singing, 'Ain't no mountain high enough, ain't no valley low enough, ain't no river

wide enough, to keep me from you', I was at school, learning

from a schools television programme called 'High, Wide and Deep.' Although I remembered what the cover of the workbook looked like, also the very enlightened teacher who led us in this learning and really enjoying it, I couldn't remember much about the content, but thanks to Google I'm reminded that it was a science and geography teaching tool that focussed on the environment. Yes, really, we were learning about the environment as long ago as that, and perhaps this is where seeds were sown in me for a lifetime's concern for the welfare of creation.

Just as in a pop song, the words 'High, low and wide' can describe the power of love, 'High, wide and deep' are three little words that encompass simply and yet concisely the vastness and wonder of creation. The height of the skies, the breadth of the land and the depth of the waters and soil are all places where life begins and ends and where processes that support life take place. Tragically they're also places where processes that threaten life happen too, as we face this climate crisis.

For many people it's in the height, breadth and depth of creation that they encounter God or at least some sense of there being a divine creator of all that surrounds us. Certainly it



seems that the writer of a Sunday School ditty had a sense of God in creation when they described Jesus's love as: 'Wide, wide as the ocean, High as the heavens above, Deep, deep as the deepest sea is my Saviour's love'.

Through the summer months we perhaps have a greater sense of the height, breadth and depth of creation as the skies stay light long into the evening, when we walk in the countryside more and maybe visit the coast where our horizons are broadened and where we can try and visualise the depths of the seas.

In turn this gives us a sense of the height, breadth and depth of God in whose universe we live.

If we've been taught that God is only 'high', as in above the clouds somewhere, it's helpful for us to grasp that God is also wide and deep and active all around us, and we can be part of God's continuing work of creation by healing and not harming the world that we've been given, a world with the ability to sustain all life if only we can tread gently upon it.

The museum is open Tues-Fri 9:30am-1:30pm and the first Saturday of the month 10am-4pm and is free of charge.


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AUTHOR REVISITS ALMA MATER
