FLUSHED WITH SUCCESS

Hollowell's newly refurbished sewage works

Nestled behind the hedges of the Creaton Road there now lies a state-of-the-art sewage works designed to process the effluvium of up to 1,700 derrieres. This facility has been receiving "submissions" from the residents of Guilsborough, Cold Ashby, Thornby, Coton, Teeton, Highfield Park & Hollowell since the 1930s. Now, as a result of a £2.4 million investment by Anglian Water, it is well on the way to ensuring that its outputs meet new standards that come into play in 2024.

In January 2023, a section of hedge was removed from the Creaton Road, and a temporary metal road was constructed to enable the ingress of trucks, diggers, and engineers into the place that deals with your egress. Your intrepid Village Link reporter donned wellington



boots and a hard hat for a tour of the facility, which was kindly conducted by Colin Watts of MWH and Paul Garner of Skanska (pictured left) who are, respectively the Construction Site Manager and the Construction Manager for the poop processing plant.

The upgrade consists of three stages:

I. A new storm retention tank. During times of storm or heavy rain, when the old

plant couldn't cope, screened effluent would overspill into storage tanks which would overflow in particularly wet weather resulting in diluted raw effluent being discharged, untreated, into Stowe Brook. To minimise these pollution incidents, a huge tank, about 2 metres high and 14m across, has been constructed to hold our emissions. The tank is

serviced by a complex and impressive system of pumps and back-up pumps that can move sewage around the site. The pumps are automatically monitored, and rotated, to ensure that they wear at an even rate. Thus, will we hold back the deluge from Stowe Brook.

2. A new Phosphorous processing scheme. The new site has a small chemical dosing plant. Those of you who were paying attention when Village Link ran its path-breaking story about fatbergs will know that some things should never be flushed down the lavatory. Such items – rags, sanitary towels, wet wipes and so on – are filtered out, but the resultant stew contains phosphates that come from washing powders, detergents, and the fertilizers used in farming, and that cause excessive algae growth in fresh water. The "P Dosing" plant trickles an iron compound into the stew, which bonds with the phosphates and so causes them to sink to the bottom, where they can be de-sludged' by weight, volume and hydraulics and then extracted and taken off site by tanker.

3. A new Tertiary filtration plant. Hollowell's sewage works is moving with the times. Our sewage plant will continue to honour the old ways by treating sewage using huge circular filtration beds where bacteria break down our (ahem) solids, but we will in the future replace the reed bed through which the broken-down effluviant runs, with a new tertiary plant that will sieve the partially cleaned waste through large cloth filters. The filters will be washed every few hours; your reporter has been assured that this task will



be performed by machines and not people. Treated effluent will be returned to Stowe Brook and solid leftovers will be recirculated through the works.

The new works will be completed by the end of November 2023. At this time, the temporary road will be removed, the hedge will be restored, and the ground will be landscaped. But, while it may then be out of sight, the new sewage plant will never be out of mind. It will be visited three times per week by Site Optimisers, who will take samples of our effluent and who will check that the site is running smoothly. All of the overhead electricity cables that currently service the site will by then have been moved underground and a crack team of specialist responders will monitor the site remotely from Lincoln, ready to rush here immediately should an alarm sound.

Birding Notes – Rare Tern makes a brief appearance

In this edition I'll look back to one of my more memorable bird sightings of this year - and one of the most notable birds I've ever found on my local patch.

On the evening of July 18th, I made a quick after-work visit to Hollowell Reservoir. I approached Guilsborough Bay Point at 6.15pm and checked the muddy / pebbly 'beach' area that had been revealed by falling water levels. Looking through binoculars, I immediately noticed



a tern among a small group of roosting Black-headed Gulls. It was clearly larger than the gulls and appeared large-headed, with a solid black crown and strong-looking red/orange bill with a black tip. It immediately took flight and headed away low over the water. The flight action was direct and lumbering, lacking the buoyancy and lightness that Common Terns exhibit. At a range of ca. 300m the bird then commenced to turn and circle, gaining height. Continuing to turn in shallow circuits, it headed back towards my location. As it gained height and gave sideon views it appeared front-heavy, with a strikingly large and bulky head, neck and bill. As it flew overhead it called several times, I noted this as 'kree-ark' with emphasis on the lower-pitched second syllable; with a harsh, loud quality. As the bird passed overhead, black primaries extending from the tips to the bases of the feathers created a large black area extending across



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

If you're a land owner, or responsible for the land where you live, and have any trees close to the roadside, have you inspected them lately? The dark evenings are only just around the corner and a number of our street lamps are not as effective as they could be due to trees growing around them so please do check to see if your trees are causing an issue. It's also a good idea to check for any dead or dying limbs before any winter gales head our way!





And with the dark evenings in mind, perhaps it's also timely to add a reminder to always park safely if leaving your vehicle on the street. The Highway Code has several references to parking: Rule 239 includes "Do not park facing against the flow of traffic" and "When using an electric vehicle charge point, you should park close to the charge point and avoid creating a trip hazard for pedestrians from trailing cables. Display a warning sign if you can. After using the charge point, you should return charging cables and connectors neatly to minimise the danger to pedestrians and avoid creating an obstacle for other road users."

Rule 243 includes "Do not park near a school entrance; anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services; opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space; near the brow of a hill; where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles; in front of an entrance to a property; on a bend."

Rule 248 states "You MUST NOT park on a road at night facing against the direction of the traffic flow unless in a recognised parking space".

Rule 249 states "All vehicles MUST display parking lights when parked on a road or a lay-by on a road with a speed limit greater than 30 mph (48 km/h).



the majority of the outer third of the underside of the wings. Also visible at this angle were conspicuous black legs and feet.

The bird then appeared to

depart in a northerly direction. Almost as soon as I saw this bird I was fairly certain that I was looking at a Caspian Tern, Hydroprogne caspia, and as the features above were revealed I became even more sure; I just needed to rule out other large terns, e.g. Royal, which I was able to do by checking my ID guides as soon as I got home. I had been able to capture several photos once the bird was airborne up until its departure, these helped me confirm the ID.

Caspian Tern, the largest of all the terns, is a rare summer visitor to the UK, with the nearest breeding population being in Sweden, Finland and Estonia, and an otherwise global distribution. The last one I'd seen was in New Zealand in 1997. There have been six previous records in Northants, with the most recent being in 2020. It has been a relatively good year for this species in the British Isles with a number of sightings, mostly from coastal locations. Unfortunately the bird was not relocated in the county, so I was the only one to enjoy seeing this rare and impressive creature. Jon Cook
