

Playing Fields Association

As I write this, we are well and truly into autumn and experiencing very heavy rainfall. The committee, after consulting with ROSPA, have decided to replace our chipped bark safer surfacing with a more practical alternative. The cost of replacing bark every year, as well as trying to reinstate it after it has been washed away, makes it far from ideal. We are looking to use rubber matting which allows grass to grow through. This will be lower maintenance and more hygienic whilst also providing a surface with sufficient CFH (critical fall height) to cope with the equipment we have in place. This is not going to be cheap and we will be looking for grants as well as fundraising. It may be possible to carry out the replacement over several phases. Any offers of help or suggestions would be gratefully received.

The Association operates the field under the terms of a lease which only permits dogs to cross the field on the Public Footpaths whilst on a lead, the exercising of dogs is strictly prohibited. There is adequate provision locally for dogs to be exercised off leads and therefore there is no excuse to run them on the playing field. The Association has recently taken delivery of four signs reminding dog owners of this.


Our village buses

We are so lucky to have not one but two village buses but as always we need to use them or lose them. For those that still have their own transport, a gentle reminder that things may change therefore keeping the bus service running maybe the only way you can continue to live in Creaton in the future. The weekly Shopper Hopper bus service run by volunteers, is every Monday, picking up bus pass holders from Cottesbrooke, Haselbech, Creaton, Naseby, Cold Ashby, Thornby, Spratton and Brixworth and currently takes us to venues such as Aldi in Moulton and Weston Favell. We also spend time in Brixworth to enable us to go the local shops there and the library. On two Wednesdays in the month the bus goes to destinations such as Rushden Lakes, a Nursery or large shopping area. This service must be pre-booked. Contact Ka by email at: bookings@cmbus.org or phone 07888011891.

Volunteer drivers are urgently needed. Again, contact Ka if you could help please.

The 60/59 is a very popular bus service, especially the 59 from Welford to Market Harborough on Tuesdays and Fridays. The 60 bus picks up passengers at 9.30 from the bottom of the Jetty and continues to Welford where the bus number changes. Many people seem unaware that the $\pounds 2:00$ ticket price cap for every journey is still retained which makes travel very cheap for passengers without bus passes and we are all helping to reduce the traffic on our roads which we all know makes sense.

I often hear from residents in Creaton that the bus "never has any passengers on it". You need to remember that Creaton is the penultimate stop for the route returning from Northampton to either Guilsborough or Welford and can be the third pickup village running from Guilsborough to Northampton or straight from Welford to Northampton. It may have few passengers but yes, it is used. Don't forget you can also use the bus to begin or end your local walk. Every bus journey adds up and all are counted. Last year we had over 20,000 journeys on our bus, so yes, I assure you, it is used!

Creaton Village Shop is proud to announce that it was winner of the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE) Northamptonshire Community Awards 2022. The judges were most impressed by the background to the establishment of the Shop after the original village store closed whereby the village came together to raise funds to provide new premises. The judges said, *"When a community comes together to save a facility or provide a new one it always takes an enormous effort, and to keep it going as a volunteer effort for a number of years is very impressive. And if one accolade wasn't enough, Shop Manager Adam Perrins-May was nominated by the Plunkett Foundation for their Young Person Award category at the Rural Community Business awards. Adam is one of five finalists who were celebrated at the event in London in November.

Northamptonshire Police have been doing the following to make the county safer:

Operation Voltage, which is still ongoing, targeting drug dealing and misuse. So far, since the campaign was launched: 3000 wraps of class A drugs have been seized, 21 drug lines have been disrupted, 78 Arrests have been made, over £55,000 in cash has been recovered, 31 weapons have been seized, 49 persons have been safeguarded and 250 drug users have been offered support. New Roller Needed

Rolling is an important process in cricket. It improves pitch performance by compacting the soil, reducing live grass cover, and making the pitch more smooth and uniform. Rolling is the

most significant contributor to achieving the requirements of a cricket pitch, which needs to be not only true and safe to prevent injury to players but must also provide a surface that delivers an appropriate level of bounce, pace, and consistency over several days/hours of use. Rolling cricket wickets is part of the protocol for preparing safe cricket wickets twice a week from Spring to Autumn.

A new motorised roller similar to the one shown opposite is needed to replace the faulty, damaged and aged roller, and will cost £11,000. A grant will be applied for towards replacement cost, with the GPFA contributing about £3,500 towards the cost from fundraising.

The provision of safe and well maintained cricket square/wickets enables competitive team cricket to take place at Guilsborough Playing Field. Being part of a team helps many,

Schools use the Field on a regular basis: Guilsborough Academy (senior students practice their organisational and leadership skills), Guilsborough Primary (for their Sports Day) and



'Rudy' was shown at Hollowell Village Hall in October. This may all sound totally miserable, but the film had moments of humour and wonderful portrayals of everyday life. It showed both Rudy and her father coming to terms with their appalling loss.

It was a treat for the eyes and ears with beautiful photography, ranging from details of domestic activity, to urban skateboarders, to our beautiful countryside. The urban setting used was Coventry and the rural landscape was around Birdingbury and Leamington Hastings.

The music for "Rudy" was written by Japanese composer, Akira Kosemura and was atmospheric and evocative. The film is being shown in some small cinemas around the country and is currently available on Curzon Home Cinema for £10. The creators of the film are also taking it to local villages in the area. We in Hollowell count ourselves very fortunate to have benefited from this. It was a real privilege and rare insight to get the opportunity to talk to the makers of this rather special film.

HOLLOWELL STEAM RALLY GIVE-AWAY 2023

The Steam Rally Give Away ceremony, at which all the money raised during the July Rally is handed over to local organisations and charities, is often a rough night.

Positioned in the calendar as it was, in early November, the 2023 event was no exception. The participants came together in the middle of storm Ciaran, with heavy rains, 40 mph winds and a rally field so thick with mud that no-one without tow-line hitches and 4-wheel drive dared enter the field.

There we all were, on top of a big hill in a large tent, exactly where the Met Office had suggested we shouldn't be, nevertheless that tent was packed with expectant people. I was fortunate to find myself sitting next to Peter Godwin, Rally commentator for 10 plus years and a farmer from Oxfordshire.

Peter explained that he provides amateur commentary at 20 steam shows around the country each year, but Hollowell, he says, is unique. "It is the only show that is not only doing good things for the community but makes a point of being seen to do so," he said. And so it was: over the next 45 minutes £73,000 was handed out by the rally committee to more than 54 organisations, ranging from local schools, churches and playing fields to the Air Ambulance, Fire Service, Riding for the Disabled, air cadets and scout groups. This evening was unique in another sense because it was the first time that Neil Byrd had taken over the leadership of the Rally from its creator, Allen Eaton MBE.

Hollowell Steam is clearly in good hands – and Peter Godwin publicly thanked Neil for

being a very capable and "user-friendly" chairman. Almost two million pounds has been raised for good causes by Hollowell Steam in the 34 years it has been running.

At the end of the event, the participants cheered the many volunteers who do so much for our community, and who inspired so many people to brace the rain, the wind and the mud.




