Creaton Village Shop is also offering home deliveries for customers who find themselves in self-isolation in Creaton and the immediate villages. Deliveries are free and there is no minimum spend. Prescriptions from Saxon Spires Surgeries can be delivered via the shop providing the patient has organised it with the surgery. #### GUILSBOROUGH

A co-ordinating group has been set up made up of residents, the Parish Council, the GPs Surgery (Saxon Spires) and the church (St Etheldredas). They are also in close contact with the shop (Seatons Stores) and the pub (Witch & Sow). They now have a volunteers group (more are needed!) and will try to ensure that everyone in the village and wider parish:

- has someone to turn to when they need support, or just a chat, with a dedicated support contact.
- can get a hot meal delivered if they need one from the pub.

• can get shop deliveries to their home. They are also supporting the surgery and other key workers and their families wherever possible. To start this off they have put through every door a set of leaflets with helpful information and your dedicated support contact.

If you would like to volunteer (e.g. willing to deliver food, or pub meals, to houses, check on an elderly/vulnerable person who knows you, or other jobs as needed) then please join the list by contacting Amanda.




At the time of going to press the Golf Centre was continuing to operate, but the clubhouse is closed..

# COTTESBROOKE NEWS

# John Summerford

Cottesbrooke lost a resident and dear friend of the village in January this year, a true artisan simply known by some as 'The Painter'. John Summerford had a rich and varied life and his skills gave him much work in the finest properties including Althorp and grand London homes before coming to live at Cottesbrooke. Even after working in grand houses John would spend his spare time crafting and painting rocking horses for children or transforming the most mundane of objects into treasures and keepsakes for his family and friends.

John was a decorative painter who specialised in *faux* finishes favouring theatrical effects that were often more spectacular than the real thing. The main intention behind all *faux* finishes is to make surfaces look more impressive, to pass off a cheaper substance (such as wood, plaster or slate), as a more expensive one to either fit with the context of a building or piece of furniture and to create a more visually exciting design or texture such as marble, stone or tortoiseshell.

Even the Romans discovered that paint could be used to transform and counterfeit costly rare materials and it could be said that paint used in this way is almost as ancient as art itself. A new importance to the skills of the decorative painter was given during the Italian and European Renaissance. Churches, prominent homes, palaces and villas were decorated with **Trompe l'loeil** architecture framed in painted marble. Italian painters known as *depentori* were exceptionally skilled at marbling, and could produce versions of grey carraras, or breccias in purple, brown

and red still found in country churches the length and breadth of Italy.

In the late 17<sup>th</sup> century, marbling and paint finishes became fashionable all over Europe. Like real marble the painted variety tended to be associated with architectural elements, for example in church decoration to match the real marble of alters, columns and pulpits.

Specialist craftspeople and conservators can still be found working in museums, restoration workshops and on site at historic houses and buildings of historic significance throughout the UK. As a nation we have always been strong at making things and working with real materials but this has sadly fallen out of favour, disproportionately given over to digital design skills. If we value and want to keep our most precious buildings, objects and artifacts for future generations to enjoy we still need John Summerfords, the decorative painters and restorers, the lime plasterers, the master thatchers. We must treasure and grow our most precious resource of true craftspeople.

We'd like to remind residents that a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) is in place across Daventry District. The PSPO states that people in charge of a dog must:

- Pick up after the dog
- Carry the means to pick up after the dog
- Prevent the dog from entering a fenced-off children's play area, such as Creaton Playing Field
- Put the dog on a lead when requested by an authorised officer
- Put their dog on a lead in graveyards, cemeteries and memorial gardens


The Council is still holding discussions with the land owner with regard to a longer lease for the children's play area before committing any funding for new play equipment. ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

It is May 2014 and Lara Read and her family were happy and getting on and enjoying life. Lara's husband Stuart had had a very bad riding accident about 15 years previously where he had broken his back and was told he would never walk again. However, he did and life was good!



#### This is Lara's story:

"Then Stuart went to work one day, bent down and BAM! His back just went. He ended up in Northampton General Hospital with no feeling from the waist down. After a lot of physio and pain killers he again managed to walk, but unfortunately this time it left him in constant pain and unable to return to doing the manual work he was used to.

With 2 small boys to support we needed to find an income and we came up with the idea of Creaton Crafts and Gifts. We started off making wooden items for the home, which were very popular but due to Stuart's pain and mobility he wasn't able to make them on a regular basis. We were also making paper ornaments for the home from unloved books and we decided to set up our website and also a shop on a platform called Etsy. We make personalised fruit, animals and vases, all from books.

In 2015 we were contacted by Mama's & Papa's to make some of our book pumpkins for their Halloween displays in 22 of their UK stores. They contacted me on Monday and wanted them delivered by Friday. We ended up making 132 in less than 4 days! We didn't get much sleep and everywhere was orange by the time we finished, but seeing our idea and work displayed in their stores was amazing.

This inspired us to see how far our products could be distributed. We are now in Etsy's top 1% of sellers. We ship worldwide and it's fantastic to think that the items we have handmade in Creaton are in Beverly Hills 90210, Thailand, New Zealand, Australia, Germany, Singapore and many other places.

To anyone thinking of starting a small business I would highly recommend it. It is a lot of hard work but highly rewarding."
